2 Pkgs. frozen broccoli (cooked)

Skin the chicken breats, and boil for 25 minutes. Mix together in a medium size bowl the rest of the ingredients with the exception of the broccoli. Break the breasts into good size pieces and lay in the bottom of a roasting pan. Put the broccoli spears on the top of the chicken and pour the sauce over the top of the chicken and the broccoli. ELIZABETH and MILES DeCAMP

Another local gal has "done us proud". Miles, hailing all the way from Pleasant Plains in Dover Township, went to Toms River High School where he and Betty met. Also knowing a good thing when he saw it, Miles began his strategy and on January 26, forty-three years ago, they pledged their vows!

Betty, believe it or not, is one of a five generation family to live in Island Heights. Her father "Allie" Irons and his father lived in the "still occupied by an Irons" house on Central Avenue. Next to Betty and Miles on Summit Avenue lives their daughter, Bar-bara Owens and her three children, Patti, Robert and Richard. For most of their married life Betty & Miles have lived here.

After graduation Miles worked in Koller's Meat Market in Toms River, where I'm sure he never dreamed when he gave away "dog scraps" they would be worth a fortune today. From Kollers to Jersey Central Power & Light Co. where he worked for a couple of years.

Always on the upward move, Miles studied for three years at the Wharton School, an extension of the University of Pennsylvania in Philadelphia. There he majored in Finance and Economics.

His "final home" in the working field was with Prudential Insurance Co. where he toiled for twenty-eight years. While there he was an agent and a staff manager.

During all these years Miles was devotedly interested in "Our Town". Extremely interested in Education he served on the local school board (some of the time as Vice-President) for eighteen years - a record I'm sure is almost unbeatable.

During this time - for those who remember "when" - our little old school house had more than served its day, and for those who don't know, it now stands as mute reminder! - the vegetable and fruit stand on Maple Avenue and Rt. 37. Miles was chosen as the chairman of the Building Committee and our new and beautiful grade school evolved.

Schooling has always been a problem. We sent our pupils ready for high school to Toms River. At this point in time, Toms River gave us an ultimatum! Join up with Toms River School District or no more sending district pupils. Miles was appointed by the County Superintendent of Schools to discuss the possibility of a new school system with Seaside Park,

Seaside Heights, Ocean Gate, Lacey and Berkeley Townships. From this evolved Central Regional High School which has proven financially to be the right road.

Again Miles was elected to serve on the Regional Board - "our first representative" - where he served

for two three year terms.

On our own local council he was also busy. He served as Councilman for two terms. I'm sure this little "tid-bit" can go down in 'Believe it or not'. John Wana-maker, who owned what is now known as the Borough Complex offered the property to the Boro of Island Heights for one dollar! Miles saw it as a windfall, but the rest of the Council voted "no" as they said they weren't in the real estate business!

Betty, having education on her mind also, worked for five years as secretary of the Board of Education in Island Heights, then another seventeen years as secretary of the Board of Education at Central Regional High School.

Miles and Betty's retirement life is busy and full. Their beautiful home attests to the loving care of their flowers and trees. On the front lawn at Christmas time can be seen Miles handiwork - a beautiful church fashioned after the old original one in Lanoka Harbor on Route 9 - two one-story houses, one two-story house and barn and manger. At one time they had it wired for Christmas anthems - and the Holy season stirred in all of us!

Having traveled extensively to Hawaii, Canada, France and the United States they solemnly swear there is no place like home. Home where their daughter, Barbara, teaches our Kindergarten tikes and their three grandchildren climb buses to Central Regional! greater heritage do we have!!

"Our greatest concern is the ever increasing governmental costs and the tremendous debt heritage we are leaving our future generations". These are Miles and Betty's foremost thoughts - and we might all add "Amen".

HOW IT FEELS TO HAVE A HEART ATTACK

The way a heart attack feels can vary. So how can you be sure that what you're feeling is really a heart attack?

By remembering this. If you feel an uncomfortable pressure, fullness, squeezing or pain in the center of your chest (that may spread to the shoulders, neck or arms) and if it lasts for two minutes or more, you could be having a heart attack. Severe pain, dizziness, fainting, sweating nausea or shortness of breath may also occur. Sharp, stabbing twinges of pain are usually not signals of a heart attack.

Your survival may depend on getting medical attention as quickly as you can. Call the emergency medical service immediately. If you can get to a hospital faster in any other way, do so.

Don't refuse to accept the possibility that you are having a heart attack. Many heart attack victims do just that. They say it's indigestion or tension. They worry about embarrassment. They often wait three hours or longer before getting help.

But before those three hours are up, one out of two is dead.

Remember what you've just read. The time might come when your life

will depend on it. For further information contact your local Heart Association.



Boro Bits

The month of September was a busy one for the Mayor and Council with two public meetings held on the 13th and the 27th. During these meetings George Lissenden, our Borough Engineer, was commissioned to draw up the specifications for the repairs to the roof of the Main Hall and for the resurfacing of the parking lot and driveway at the Borough Complex.

A rabies clinic and flu immunization program will be held during the month of October with all information pertaining to these events to be announced. Approval was given on September 13th for Bernard Kaliske and Harry Mayer to become members of the Island Heights Volunteer Fire Company #1. Approval was also given to the second reading of ordinance 78-10 dealing with the Planning Board, and the third title reading of ordinance 78-9 dealing with zoning.

In further business, resolutions were passed to contract Towplan Associates to construct a Master Plan for our town, and for William T. Murray to survey and subdivide Block 16 Lot38. A notice to bidders for a garbage contract was similarly passed.

Our participation in the Ocean County Swim Program was also approved, as were raffle licenses for Ocean County Family Planning and the Island Heights First Aid Squad.

Councilman Murray presented a radar unit costing \$2,200 to Chief Asbury on behalf of the Council. This unit was financed through a Grant from the State and is only one of the many new advancements and programs initiated by our Police Department.

The Mayor and Council wishes to commend the efforts of our Police Department, First Aid Squad, and Fire Company for the dedication of its respective memberships in serving the residents of Island Heights.



Mrs. Pekarskis second grade has a class pet this year, "Jaws"! (a goldfish!)


The third grade, with a little help from teacher Mr. Bradley, is constructing a "human body" for their health unit. (Mr. Frank N. Stein, maybe?)




